Security

About

The security sector is generally divided in to two separate functions:

Public Security

Is the function of Governments which ensures the prevention, protection, and reaction to situations where citizens and infrastructure are at risk from harm and threats. This involves the military, all of the emergency services, police service and other public services.

Private Security

Private enterprises, that provide a wide range of activities for the manufacture, sale, installation and maintenance of technical security measures; as well as individuals that protect people, premises and property.

The **Private Security Act 2001** was introduced to regulate the private security industry and introduce a set of standards. This act also established the **Security Industry Authority (SIA)** which is part of the Home Office.

You must be **18 years and over** to work in security in the UK

A criminal record check must be completed on everyone who wants to work in security. Depending on the role you apply for, you'll be required to undergo a Basic, Standard or Enhanced check. Protecting Vulnerable Groups is the disclosure scheme in Scotland.
